## No2: Ostlings Lane



Historically, the Roman cavalry used to exercise their horses on the opposite side of the river from Bathford in Horselands. The local residents used to call Ostlings Lane Horses Lane. The meadow between Ostlings Lane and the A363 (before the houses were built) was used to graze and rest horses that pulled the mail coach to London up Bathford

Hill.

You can walk down it from Church Street, or take the hill walking challenge by walking up it from The Crown at the bottom of Bathford Hill.

9. Did you know that there is cottage by a beach in Ostlings Lane? (Ah no it is a beech tree!)




10. Can you spot the house with the round window?
